Easter

In the <u>Christian calendar</u>, Easter follows <u>Lent</u>, the period of 40 days (not counting <u>Sundays</u>) before Easter, which traditionally is observed by acts of penance and <u>fasting</u>. Easter is immediately preceded by <u>Holy Week</u>, which includes <u>Maundy Thursday</u>, the commemoration of Jesus' <u>Last Supper</u> with his disciples; <u>Good Friday</u>, the day of his Crucifixion; and <u>Holy Saturday</u>, the transition between <u>Crucifixion</u> and <u>Resurrection</u>. Liturgically, Easter comes after the <u>Great Vigil</u>, which was originally observed sometime between sunset on Easter Saturday and sunrise on Easter Sunday. Later it would be celebrated in Western churches on Saturday evening, then on Saturday afternoon, and finally on Sunday morning. In 1955 the <u>Roman Catholic Church</u> set the time for the <u>vigil</u> at 10 PM, which allowed for the Easter mass to be celebrated after midnight. In the Orthodox traditions the vigil continues to be an important liturgical event, while in <u>Protestant</u> churches it is little known.

All Christian traditions have their own special liturgical emphases for Easter. The Easter sunrise service, for example, is a distinctive Protestant observance in North America. The practice may derive from the Gospel narrative of Jesus' Resurrection, which states that Mary Magdalene went to the tomb "while it was still dark" (John 20:1) or as dawn was breaking (Matthew 28:1 and Luke 24:1). It is a service of jubilation that takes place as the sun rises to dispel the darkness.

Easter customs

Easter, like <u>Christmas</u>, has <u>accumulated</u> a great many traditions, some of which have little to do with the Christian celebration of the Resurrection but derive from folk customs. The custom of the Easter <u>lamb</u> appropriates both the appellation used for Jesus in Scripture ("behold the lamb of God which takes away the sins of the world," John 1:29) and the lamb's role as a sacrificial animal in <u>ancient Israel</u>. In antiquity Christians placed lamb meat under the altar, had it blessed, and then ate it on Easter. Since the 12th century the Lenten fast has ended on Easter with meals including <u>eggs</u>, <u>ham</u>, <u>cheeses</u>, <u>bread</u>, and sweets that have been blessed for the occasion.

Easter egg

The use of painted and decorated Easter eggs was first recorded in the 13th century.

The <u>church</u> prohibited the eating of eggs during <u>Holy Week</u>, but chickens continued to lay eggs during that week, and the <u>notion</u> of specially identifying those as "Holy Week" eggs brought about their

decoration. The egg itself became a symbol of the Resurrection. Just as Jesus rose from the tomb, the egg symbolizes new life emerging from the eggshell. In the Orthodox tradition eggs are painted red to symbolize the blood Jesus shed on the cross.

The custom of associating a <u>rabbit</u> or bunny with Easter arose in Protestant areas in Europe in the 17th century but did not become common until the 19th century. The <u>Easter rabbit</u> is said to lay the eggs as well as decorate and hide them. In the United States the Easter rabbit also leaves children baskets with toys and candies on Easter morning. In a way, this was a <u>manifestation</u> of the Protestant rejection of Catholic Easter customs. In some European countries, however, other animals—in Switzerland the <u>cuckoo</u>, in Westphalia the <u>fox</u>—brought the Easter eggs.

Maundy Thursday, also called Holy Thursday or Sheer Thursday, the Thursday before <u>Easter</u>, observed in commemoration of <u>Jesus Christ</u>'s institution of the <u>Eucharist</u> during the <u>Last Supper</u>.

The name is thought to be a Middle English derivation taken from a Latin anthem sung in Roman Catholic churches on that day: "Mandatum novum do vobis" ("a new commandment I give to you"; John 13:34). In most European countries, Maundy Thursday is known as Holy Thursday; other names are Green Thursday (Gründonnerstag; common in Germany), from the early practice of giving penitents a green branch as a token for completing their Lenten penance, and Sheer Thursday (clean Thursday), which refers to the ceremonial washing of altars on this day.
