ong winter nights and months going by without horseshoe pitching? About the only thing we can do is reflect. What should we wish for in the coming year? What kind of resolutions should we make for horseshoes? How can we make 2008 a notable year for our sport?

Most of us would agree that increasing our numbers would be a worthwhile goal. When we look back, we honestly have to reason that what we're doing now or more to the point what we've done in the past does little more than keep our numbers static.

Reflecting on what we've done right, we can point to a strong Jr. program. It is respected across the nation. Art Sperber's leadership was responsible in large for that success. WSHPA members have been generous with their dollars and that has lead to the success of the Jr. Program.

If an organization is to grow, it must attract new people. Our local clubs represent who we are in our communities. There are curious people in our communities who would join us if we would reach out to them. Each club that has money in it's budget should use some of those unused \$ for advertising.

In the WSHPA budget there is a line item for promotions. The budget committee has for several years left that line item unfunded.

A business card size ad in a weekly paper costs about \$25 a week. 20 weeks of advertising would cost a club about \$500. If the promotions line item in the budget were funded with \$2500, and those \$ were cost shared 50/50 with ten clubs, \$250 would buy a summers worth of advertising for each club.

Who should your advertising target? There are a number of people who would bring their youngsters out if they understood that they and their kids can compete together. Your advertising should entice people to come out by feeding them a taco, or a hamburger or pizza and an introduction to horseshoe pitching. Use your time as a teaching event as well as league play. 

'Shoeless' Herb Criss Makes the Hall of Fame

Shoes or the lack thereof have played an important role in the life of Herb Criss, who Saturday afternoon at Olympic College will be inducted into the Kitsap Sports Hall of Fame during ceremonies in the commons area at the school.

His place in the local Hall of Fame could not have been predicted and comes as a surprise to the 83-year-old Criss, who at one time was one of the best — if not the best — horseshoe pitcher in the Pacific Northwest.

Growing up in the hills of West Virginia, Criss was lucky to own a pair of shoes, so coming this far and joining a group of the best athletes to come out of West Sound has Criss stunned but honored.

"My kids and grandkids are excited for me, but I'm not really too excited," says Criss, who in 53 years of pitching horseshoes has won nine state titles, nine northwest championships, and one world title. "I don't know why. I know it's a great honor. I was voted into the Washington Horseshoe Pitchers Association Hall of Fame in 1982, and I got nominated for the National (Horseshoe Pitchers Association) Hall of Fame. I got mentioned, but didn't get in. So that was a great honor, too, for me.

"I hope I don't have to get up and say anything. My voice isn't too good."

Criss has lived in West Sound since 1942, married Audrey in 1946 and together they live in Seabeck. It was in 1942 at the age of 18 that he was hired by visiting recruiters to come west and work at the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard, which at the time was bulging with World War II work.

Those first 18 years of his life were not easy, not that he would know. You are what you are and often that means accepting the circumstances of your life without much complaint. So it was with Criss, who grew up in Grantsville, W.V. — "A little ol' town nobody has heard of" — which today has a population of 565, just about what it was when he lived there as a youngster.

Everybody he knows is gone from Gransville now, but he used to go back every seven years or so to visit family and friends, and refresh the memories of that life, which included halting his public school education in the eighth grade after the town's only school burned down. Village citizens made do with classrooms in various town buildings, but Criss skipped all that.

"I didn't go to school, I just ran around (in the summers) fishing, playing softball, swimming, and just being a kid," said Criss, who in the winter would go sledding and ice skating on the Kanawha River, which runs through Grantsville.

There was a time when small hill towns in the South — the Carolinas, Tennessee, Kentucky and the Virginias — were populated by mountain people whose main occupation was the brewing of moonshine and playing music of the soul, which was the beginning of American Bluegrass.

"That was me," said Criss, although he didn't play the music or brew the moonshine. "I remember one time I didn't have any shoe

They medivaced him to Harborview Medical where we know he is in the best of care. They have kept him in an induced coma. On Wednesday they took him to surgery to repair the pelvis - determined it would heal by itself so went no further -Miracle #1. Took him off the drug inducement Friday morn and sometime during the day he opened his eyes and did move his hands - Miracle #2. At this time thats all we know. The waiting is hard, the emotions are on the edge. In our helplessness we are so thankful for the Lord's love.

Thoughts from Phyl



I vividly remember the day our first and only grandchild was born - 18 years ago. Kyle Allen was 6 hours old and as I held him in my arms, the tears rolled down my checks. My heart knew that this was the extension of my life and that incredible feeling of love and pride engulfed me.

On October 21st, this year, 10:30 p.m. we received the phone call that shattered our lives. Kyle had been in a horrible car crash and was not expected to live. They medivac'd him immediately to Harborview Medical in Seattle. He was in a coma, bleeding on the brain, jaw broken, all bones in his face fractured, back broken in three places, broken pelvis, cracked hips, etc. etc. All we could do was fall on our knees and pray. Word went out to family, to church family, to horseshoe family and to friends – just pray! My heart was exploding with pain and all I wanted was to just hold him in my arms again.

Many of your know of the progressive events that have happened since that day – 4 days after the accident they did surgery to repair pelvis - found it would probably heal itself and went no further. They would only do back surgery if he could breathe on his own for a least 6 hours -7days after the accident they did back surgery! Kyle was becoming alert and recognizing people. 2

weeks after the accident, when our son visited him, Kyle Allen did the fist to fist hit with his dad went he was leaving. 2 ½ weeks after the accident Kyle Allen asked to sit in a chair, when the nurse returned to the room later – he was back in bed – by himself! The list goes on and on.


November 26, Kyle Allen was released from the hospital and came home! He has a brace on his back, steel plates in his cheeks, jaw wired - but his mind is sound and he's walking using a walker. The nurses in the ER even cried when they heard - they said it was impossible. He still has a ways to go - but he's going to make it!

There is only one answer for the miracles that have happened, and that is the collective power of prayer. We have been overwhelmed by the incredible prayer chains that have truly reached around the world. There is no way we can convey our gratitude and thanks to each of you. You helped save a life, You helped heal relationships, You made a difference, You are so very special to us. Thank you.

Many of you, I know, have experienced severe trauma in your lives. I don't know your outcomes in these situations, but I do know that without incredible caring of family and friends, none of us would survive very well. Again, thank you. Mira-

We had a flood and I found a tennis shoe. I put it on, and then about two weeks later I found the other one.

"I used to walk around with the top of my soles flapping. Oh, we were poor, really poor. You come in from Parkersburg and drive down the hill to (Grantsville) and we lived at the bottom of the hill next to the river (Kanawha).

"The river flooded every year and we would have to move out of the house because it became so muddy. Then when the river receded we would come back and go to work, cleaning up the mud. It was a mess."

You could have called him "Shoeless Herb" back then.

"When I would see the Robins out (in the spring), I figured it was time to go barefoot," he said, "and we did. We lived in the river. Swimming, that is all we done."

Well, not entirely.

"After swimming, I just ran around with my uncle in the hills, chasing rabbits and stuff. What else was there to do? Nothing. Oh, we played ball, but there wasn't a heck of a lot to do there.

"I never did go back to school. When I came out here I was dumber than hell. I didn't know which end was up. But I made it. I just learned what was in the world, I guess. I was lucky because I learned how to write and read. Thank heaven for that. A lot of people I knew couldn't read or write."

Criss immediately fell in love with pitching horseshoes when he was first led to the sport. That, bowling (he quit eight years ago when his elbow began acting up) and golf became his second life. About a dozen years ago Criss was an 8-handicapper at Gold Mountain. He still golfs three days a week with three other friends, although his handicap has slipped to an 18.

"I have had eight holes-in-one," said Criss, almost as an afterthought. Five have been on the Cascade Course at Gold Mountain (two on the 17th hole), two at the old Clover Valley Golf Course (they came on back-to-back days on the same hole), and one at Tacoma's Allenmore Golf Course.

But it's horseshoes where he has made his reputation. Saturday he was at the Fairgrounds competing in the winter league, pitching 65-percent ringers from 30 feet (regulation is 40 feet, but the NHPA has a division of 30 feet for people 70 and over). Last month he was in Bellingham competing in the 30-foot state tournament.

Years ago, Criss threw the only perfect game in Northwest Horseshoe Pitchers Association history, 24 ringers out of 24, beating his opponent, 40-0, He and the legendary Ed Fishel of Spokane once hooked up in a duel where they both threw four "deads" eight consecutive times. Deads is when both competitors get ringers with their two throws, and then do it eight straight times.

"That was in Spokane at the state tournament," Criss said. "He missed (on the ninth pitch) and I went on to 13 consecutive doubles (ringers)."

Criss has no plans to slow down his horseshoe pitching. "I'm fairly agile at my age, and I want to keep doing it," he said. "A lot of guys use hooks to pick up their 'shoes, but I don't do that. I bend over and get 'em." But there is one concession he's given to being older. Criss now wears shoes.
