### In Memory of Paul James Tutewiler - November 16, 1933 - May 4, 2016



Paul James Tutewiler was born in Momence, Illinois on November 16, 1933. He was welcomed by his parents and two older sisters, Leafy and Alvera. His family moved to California when he was young in search of prosperity when his dad bought a piece of property that was said to have gold on it. At 13, his family moved to Fairfax, Washington. He attended White River High School and graduated from there in 1951.

He enlisted in the U.S. Navy after graduation and was stationed in Astoria, Oregon. He met Clydene through mutual friends. When they were courting, he would hitchhike from Astoria on Friday and back on Sunday nights so he could report for duty Monday morning. He received orders to transfer to Long Beach, California in early 1953. At this time, he and Clydene realized there would be no more weekend trips to the Buckley area and decided to get married. They married at the home of her parents on April 14th of that same year. They moved to Long Beach where they were part of the Navy community. Paul travelled to Japan and Korea on board the USS Collett while Clydene held down the fort at home.

When Paul was discharged from active duty, they moved back to Washington State to be near family. Paul went to work for the Boeing Company in 1955. He started work on the assembly

line and 36 years later when he retired he was a Quality Control Supervisor.

Paul was an active community member. He served as a volunteer firefighter with the Sumner Fire Department for 25 years. During this time, he rose to the rank of Lieutenant and received both the Jack Woodward Firefighter of the Year Award in 1993 and the Fire Chiefs Award in 1995. He was given a key to the City of Sumner for his 25 years of faithful service.

Paul took a lot of pride in his family. As his two children were growing up, he helped with Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Little League. No matter what his kids did, he was always there to support them. The same can be said for his grandchildren. Whether they were playing baseball or football, riding motocross or golfing, Paul could be found somewhere on the sidelines cheering them on.

Paul enjoyed many activities throughout his 82 years. He made friends wherever he went. Both he and Clydene square-danced and round danced for several years. He was even known to do a line dance or two. He bowled in a league for many years and loved to go camping and fishing. He was a member of the Sumner United Methodist Church for over 40 years where he handed out over 200 cross lapel pins to friends and newcomers. He also belonged to the Puyallup Elks Lodge for over 50 years.

Since retirement, he and Clydene have put many miles on their vehicles as they hit the road to destinations throughout the U.S. Every time they took off for a new adventure, they would sing Willie Nelson's, "On the Road Again". One of their grandest adventures was a month long trip up the Al-Can Highway to Alaska. It was a trip of a lifetime and they made tons of wonderful memories along the road. They also spent numerous years doing the 'snowbird' thing; wintering in Palm Springs and Arizona and returning to the great Northwest for the spring and summer months.

Paul was not one to sit still for very long and always had some kind of project going. He loved doing things with his hands and blessed many of his friends with gifts from his woodworking shop.

He loved sports and spent many hours watching local baseball and football teams as well as the professionals. The Seahawks and Mariners were his favorites and he loved taking in a game at the Tacoma Rainiers.

In the late 1990's, Paul developed a new passion, pitching horseshoes. He was a member of the Olympia Horseshoe Club and made many friends throughout his travels with the horseshoe groups. He has three Washington State plaques that are full of all the different tournaments that he participated and placed in. He travelled to the World Horseshoe Tournaments several times and enjoyed meeting people from all over.

His other love in his recent years was the Sumner Food Bank Backpacks for Children program. He and Clydene helped spearhead the program between the Sumner United Methodist Church and the Food Bank. Each month they would pick up the food collected through the church and transport it to the food bank. It always brought him joy to see Clydene's excitement at making the announcement each month of how much food and money had been collected for this worth-while project.

Paul went to his Heavenly home on May 4, 2016. He was preceded in death by his parents, Paul O. and Estel (Randolph) Tutewiler, his older sister and brother-in-law, Leafy (Finnace 'Slim') Willis, and three nephews, Allen and David Willis and Larry Bell. He is survived by his wife of 63 years, Clydene; his sister, Alvera (Lawrence) Bell; his daughter, Paula (Mark) Wheeler; his son, Dennis (Pam) Tutewiler; four grandchildren and four great grandchildren as well as many extended family members..

He was loved by all and will be missed by many.



### **Pitching Tips-Flight** Wobble and Landing

As in boxing, there are "right and left hooks" in horseshoe pitching. Right handed players should try to make their ringers hook onto the stake from the lefthanded side. Left- handers should try for right hooks. That way, the shoes do not go too straight on the stake, thus lessening the hazard of rebound. The hookingtype shoe, with good wobble, will stay on much better than one that is thrown too flat and too straight on the stake. A good flight wobble helps break the shoe's momentum in landing. The wobble imparts enough twists to the shoe to keep it from going on too straight and rebounding. A shoe will usually stay on when it hooks the stake from either side, just off center of the toe-caulk.

Too much flight- wobble can cause a shoe to travel erratically and fly off the stake. Also, it is difficult to watch in flight. Excessive wobble can be caused by too much arm and wrist effort. Another cause may be a faulty grip, especially if you try to correct the trajectory with your thumb when releasing the shoe. Some expert players have more wobble on their shoes than others. That depends on their grips and methods of delivering.

The "breaks of the game" mean a lot to champion pitchers. The way in which their shoes land can mean either the winning or losing of a title. When a shoe lands heel-caulks first, it nose-dives at the stake. It may either jump away or wedge against the stake. If the toe-caulk lands first, the shoe may either turn over backward or skid past the stake. The "deadfalling shoe," with all the caulks landing simultaneously, is best. Horseshoes, like airplanes, must make a good three-point landing. Otherwise, they bounce, skid, and roll.

### **NORM'S NEWS**












#### **NEW LOGO PATCH AVAILABLE**
