### Commentary: Jerry Clark

he weather was cool, sunny, and clear, as we got ready for the official start of the 2016 Horseshoe Pitching Season in Washington State. Given the nice weather, it was a little disappointing to only have 24 pitchers on hand at the Tulip Open at Burlington's Skagit Riverside Park. There were three, 8 person mixed classes ready to go, 40 points or 40 shoes, whichever came first. When the dust had settled by midafternoon, the Class A and Tournament Champion was Barry Chapelle of Portland, OR with a 7/0 record and an outstanding 66.17 ringer percentage. Jerry Phillips of Bellingham took Class B with a 5/2 record and 32.01%, while Class C was won by Skagit Club member Ross Scott with a 6/1 record and a 20.38%.

We are now entering into that time of year, when the weather is improving, we have a lot more sunshine, and all of our big horseshoe events for 2016 are all out in front of us. We should be bubbling over with enthusiasm for our great game. Because of all the "down time" I've been experiencing the past couple years, it would be very easy for me to lose some of the fire in my belly, but I'm not going to let that happen. There are a number of persons in horseshoes that I love and respect very much that really





Let's assume you are the average picnic pitcher. You don't really know how to hold or release the shoe. When you make a ringer, it's more a matter of luck than science.

I promise you, if you'll follow these tips and practice a few times a week, you can raise your average by 25% in one year. Why, I've known beginners who got their averages up to 50% within that time. (That means a ringer every other

First, get the right horseshoes. Ask for professional shoes, not "picnic shoes." The professional shoe is flatter, has longer hooks at the ends, and most important of all, is better balanced. You can't become an outstanding pitcher with poorly balanced shoes. Now your grip. Many beginners hold the shoe at the back and flip it end over end. You'll never get very far that way.

Instead, hold the shoe car the side, with the fingers under-neath and the thumb on top. The three middle fingers grip the shoe at the first or second joint; the little finger is spread a little way from the others and is there for balance only. Remember that you're striving for balance and control. Your grip should

striving for balance and control. Your grip should feel natural—not too tight, not too slack.

You can hold the shoe on either side—with the open end facing toward you or away from you. (The "caulk" at the back of the shoe is always down.) With the open end toward you, the shoe will rotate clockwise through 1½ turns from the moment of release, before it reaches the stake. With the open end away from you, it will go through either ¾ or 1½ turns. You have to experiment and find which is best for you. The shoe gets its rotation from the movement of your wrist upward and to the right at the moment of release. To slow down the rotation, grip it a little tighter. (This is all stated for right-handers. Left-handers just reverse things and give the shoe a counterclockwise rotation.)

The first thing you should practice is to get the shoe to "open up." You can worry about hitting the stake after you have mastered that.



To start your pitch, stand at the left of the stake if you are right-handed. This narrows your angle at the far stake and cuts a couple of feet off the distance you have to throw. Stand at a point where one natural stride will take you right up to the foul line.

Now sight through or over your shoe. Your goal is to have the open end of your shoe meet the lower half of the stake. Pick a point on the stake and keep your eye on it throughout the pitch. You are standing erect but relaxed. Your feet are parallel, an inch or so apart. You crouch slightly and bring your arm down and back—how far back depends on what feels comfortable. Your arm is straight. No cocked elbows, please. As you bring the shoe forward, you step out with your left foot (for right-handers). You release the shoe at about 30 degrees from the horizontal.

Remember that you are pitching straight ahead, with your whole body. The entire motion is much like bowling. Or think of the way a baseball pitcher throws, with


a fluid, coordinated movement of his whole body. If you've done it all right, the shoe will follow a gentle rainbow curve, rising to a height of 7 to 10 feet some 25 feet out. Five or ten feet from the far stake it should have rotated to the open position. It

Five or ten feet from the far stake it should have rotated to the open position. It will come down at about a 30-degree angle to meet the stake, you hope, near ground level. (You aren't trying to skip the shoe in. This won't work at all on clay.)

Your keys to better pitching are balance, concentration, and practice. Balance means a balanced shoe, balanced grip, and balanced body. Concentration? I know that if I've got anything else on my mind, my average falls off. When you're out there pitching, forget your job, your wife, everything. Think horseshoes.

As for practice, an hour of pitching three or four times a week can turn you into the best pitcher in the neighborhood. Maybe the best in town. Besides it's fun.

Great exercise, great relaxation, and a great personal challenge.



# On the tournament trail with....Gaylord Lund

Gaylord and Kandy Lund have been married for forty-four years and have lived all but one of them in Arlington, WA. They raised three grown sons, Brian, Brock and Brandon. Gaylord was born in Mount Vernon, but lived in a number of communities in the King, Snohomish, and Skagit County areas. He graduated from Meadowdale High School in Lynnwood and after graduating he attended Seattle Central Community College Culinary School on Capital Hill in Seattle. Even after cooking school, Gaylord still spent the great majority of his working career in wood industries. He spent eleven years in sawmills, and twenty-two more working at Northwest Hardwoods.

As for some of Gaylord's favorite hobbies, they include barbequing, woodworking, coaching, activities with the family, and of course pitching horseshoes. He is a member of the Everett Horseshoe Club.

Like so many of us, his first recollection of horseshoes was at family picnics when he was about 8-10 years of age. His first contact with organized horseshoe pitching was at the 1969 Winetrouts when they were held at Woodland Park in Seattle, where he was pitching a percentage in the teens.

At this period of time, Gaylord was working at Canlis restaurant, a very popular upscale place at the south end of the Aurora Bridge in Seattle. He has now been a member of the WSHPA for about 25 years. His favorite courts to pitch on are Bellingham and Burlington. Gaylord pitches Alan Francis horseshoes, and switches back and forth between the one and three quarter and one and a quarter grips.

Two memorable games of his that came to mind were a very close playoff loss to Art Sperber at the Bellingham International, and one time at the Hermiston Money Tournament in Oregon, when he beat the great Oregon pitcher, Ben Weidrich. He also had fond memories of a time in Bellingham when he was having a terrible game against the Canadian BC Women's Champion. She skunked him, but he came back the second day to beat her. That was sweet!

Gaylord enjoys the great friendships he has made through his years in the game, they truly are one of the great benefits of pitching horseshoes. In 2001, Gaylord and John Perucca, were the winners of the very first state doubles championships. Gaylord estimates that he has participated in 18 state singles championships and has attended 4 world tournaments with the following results:

He has performed very well on the world stage.

Gaylord told me he didn't go out on very many dates, but took one young lady out to the Italian Spaghetti House and Pizzeria in Lake City. He wasn't feeling very good that night, in fact he was a little bit sick, and it turns out he had to have his appendix taken out the next day. The young lady must have felt sorry for him, married him and they've been married for forty-four years since.

# A message to our readers....Jerry Clark

Do you remember in Junior High, when your teacher asked you to write a paper on what you wanted to be when you grew up, or your future career choice? My paper was on being a sports broadcaster or sports writer. To me there was never any doubt what I wanted to be when I got to adulthood. I was involved in sports all through school, with deep interest in all sporting events. I also love statistics and keeping stats and I love baseball box scores. So it was obvious that if I couldn't play sports in to college, I wanted to follow that career path. Part of that career path was to investigate what has to be done, education wise, in order to get gainful employment for a newspaper and what I found out was that you had to take a lot of journalistic courses which, in my estimation, didn't seem related to my career choice and related courses tied to the major didn't hold a lot of interest to me. At that time I was working in a popular Seattle restaurant during my high school days and past high school, so going to college was not extremely appealing to me. I ended up going to Seattle Central Community College Culinary School. As a matter of fact, I was going there at the same time Gaylord Lund was going there and that is where I got to know the big fella. So I kind of followed a career path that wasn't my first love. I only lasted about 10 years in the food industry and at the end of that period of time I was burned out and not knowing what to do next. By this time, Susan and I were married and



needing to have a steady income did not lend itself to going to college. I was fortunate to pick up a couple of union warehouse jobs that paid a livable wage and at that point I thought my dreams of being a sports reporter were long gone.

After a working career of 47 years, I got introduced to horseshoe pitching in my late 50s. I was learning what I needed to know to become a proficient pitcher, but I have to admit, I was getting into the game a little bit later than I wanted to. After being involved in the WSHPA for about 4 years, Jim Link stepped down in 2013 as Shoes News Editor. I started to get the itch to see if I could handle some type of sports publication, even on a limited basis. Believe me, I knew even this wouldn't be easy. I was not a high tech person and although I thought I could handle the creative side of it, the technical aspects of it, were going to be very difficult. I had a lot of trepidation about whether to take this job on, and I did not have a lot of expertise when it came to horseshoes, although I was learning about it, and had interest in it. I would probably not have taken it on had not Susan and our daughter, Maureen, kept telling me that I could to it. They told me they would give me the computer assistance that I would need. And that is what probably pushed me over the edge. So, in October 2013 we embarked on becoming the new Shoes News Editor and we had a couple months to figure out what we were trying to do and then it was off to the races. Had Shoes News been produced more than once a month, we might have been in trouble. Dealing with deadlines and making sure we had all the dates and information to our readers in enough advance time, took some getting used to. You have to constantly be about a month ahead of schedule to keep the readers informed of everything.

To wrap all this up, a number of weeks ago, I informed Dennis Tutewiler that I have decided to step down as the Shoes News Editor/ Publisher due to this battle I am currently waging with cancer. Initially, we thought we could finish out the 2016 season, but my energy level, focus, and time requirements are just not going to be sufficient for me to continue. The past few weeks my strength and energy have been totally sapped and starting on April 12th I will be back on a twelve week round of chemo.

Shoes News has been the fulfillment of a dream of mine, to write about a sport I've been very passionate about, even if it only lasted about 7 or 8 years. I feel I owe it to you, our Shoes News subscribers but mostly to my family to turn my full efforts to my treatments and restoring my health if that is God's will for me. But, I want you all to know that the last two and half years have been a joy and a privilege beyond words.




